### Elon Seniors Are Working As Teachers

Sixty-seven Elon College seniors are now engaged in practice teaching in schools of this area, some in Burlington City Schools and some in the various units of the Alamance County schools system.

The group went into the classrooms some weeks ago and have now finished almost half of their assignments, with their teaching chores to be completed before the close of the spring semester at Elon College the third week in May.

The practice teachers, as listed by Dr. Arnold C. Strauch, includes twenty-four in the high school field, seven in the junior high school field, and thirty-six in the primary, elementary and middle school fields.

### Contemporary Affairs Lecturer Frasure Speaks In Elon Student Center

Dr. Carl M. Frasure, dean of the college of arts and sciences at the University of West Virginia, widely known as an authority in the field of government and political science, spoke on the Middle East crisis when he appeared in the William S. Long Student Center on Thursday night of last week.

Dr. Frasure, who appeared at Elon College under the sponsorship of the Contemporary Affairs Symposium, is a native of Ohio and has been a member of the faculty at the University of West Virginia since 1927, and there he has gained national reputation as an advisor and consultant for

state and federal government officials.

Dr. Frasure has worked with every state administration in West Virginia since 1933 and personally developed the West Virginia Merit System while serving as a Social Security advisor in West Virginia in 1940 and 1941. He has held numerous positions in the West Virginia state government advisory system through the past thirty-five years.

During World War II, he was state director of the Office of Price Administration, and during the Korean crisis he was recalled to head the state office of price stabilization. At present he is

consultant in the regional and national offices of the Office of Emergency Planning, which is concerned with continuity of government programs in event of nuclear attack or natural disaster.

As chairman of the University of West Virginia's department of political science, Dr. Frasure reactivated the University's Bureau for Government Research. He is the author of a number of books, some of which are widely used as textbooks in universities and colleges all over the United States.

He holds the A.B., M.A. and Ph. D. degrees from Ohio State University, and in addition he also

holds the honorary Doctor of Laws from Morris Harvey College.
