The Elon Fighting Christians close out their 1969 grid campaign this Saturday night as they host the Gardner-Webb Bulldogs of Boiling Springs, N.C. Gametime is 7:30 p.m. in Burlington's Memorial Stadium. Coach Norman Harris' squad has found the going rough in their first season against senior colleges. The Bulldogs have held their own against the junior colleges on their schedule, but the senior colleges have beaten them rather soundly.

Directing the Bulldog offense is returning quarterback Sid Bryson, halfbacks David Gibbons and Miles Aldige, and fullback Ted Luckadoo. Heading the offensive line are ends Ken Reid and Larry Sechrist, tackles Hardin Davis and James Washburn, guard Jim Seacord, and center Jimmy Hartline.

Heading the defense for the Bulldogs is All-Conference linebacker and co-captain Billy Scott, middle guard Ray Miller, end Ken Pettus, tackle Bruce Harris, and defen-

sive backs Terry Purvis and Gary Gist. The game should be an interesting one, as well as being the last for 14 seniors on the squad. It will mark the last home appearance for such Christian stars as Richard McGeorge, Marty Bennett, Jim Wailer, Emery Moore, and Sanford Reveley, to mention a few.

Recent Grad To Be Added To Elon Board Of Trustees

Elon President, J. Earl Danieley, proposed to the Board of Trustees in their annual fall meeting that each year a graduate from the preceding year be named to a two-year term on the board of trustees.

In approving this proposal, the Board included the stipulation that these recent graduates rank in the top ten per cent of their class and not be allowed to succeed themselves.

"The members of the Board are very enthusiastic about this approach which will provide for young alumni to serve as trustees soon after the completion of their college work," commented Dr. Danieley in making the announcement.

The first election will be held in April, 1970, at which time a member of the class of 1968 will be elected to a one-year term and a member of the class of 1969 will be elected to a two-year term. In the spring of 1971 a member of the class of 1970 will be elected to begin service on July 1 when the term of the trustee from the class of 1968 expires.

This new procedure will not affect the total number of trustees which is 36. The young alumni will be replacing trustees whose terms have expired.

Those "never knew it happened" students in the third classification might be called College vegetables. You know the type—the students who go to class and just sit and stare. After class they go back to the dorm and study.

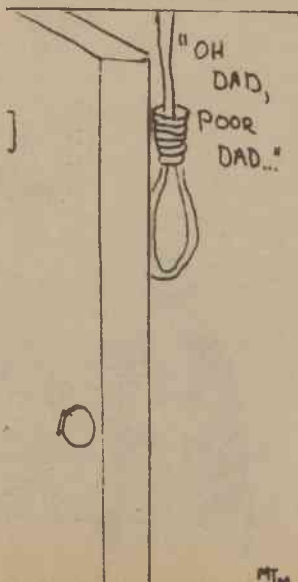
