# Supt. Erwin Favors Pay Hike

A minimum teacher salary of \$2,400 a year had the support recently of Dr. Clyde A. Erwin, North Carolina superintendent of public instruction.

Erwin urged the \$2,400 minimum in an address before superintendents as the North Carolina Education association opened its annual meeting in Raleigh April 16th.

He also recommended:

- 1. Immediate reduction of teached loads from 34 to 30 students per teacher.
- 2. An apropriation of \$25,000,-000 to help cities and counties build new school plants.
- 3. Payment of teacher salaries over a 10-month period.
- 4. A longer term of office for superintendents of city and county schools.
