### Enriched Teacher Training Program

Observed in every activity about the College is its aim "to prepare teachers for the public school, especially the rural schools of North Carolina." The location on the campus of the Newbold Training School, perhaps one of the largest of its kind in the South, has greatly enhanced the operation of the teacher-training program and made it possible to enrich the course offerings. Pupils who attend Newbold are drawn from the campus and from the community.

The whole teacher-training program is pointed community-ward. Not only are the students taught how to teach in the rural communities, but for a period, the seniors actually serve an internship in rural teaching. Arrangements are made with principals and superintendents and the students are transported to and from select rural schools by bus.
