FAYETTEVILLE

Fayetteville, "The Friendly City," was the first town in the United States to be named for the Marquis de LaFayette. The village was first called Campbellton, then Cross Creek, but in 1783 the name was changed to Fayetteville in honor of the French General. In 1784 Moore County was formed from Cumberland. During 1855 a portion of Cumberland was taken off, forming Harnett County. Hoke County was also formed from a part of Cumberland. The northeastern part of the county was added to Harnett after 1900. On June 20, 1775, only a month after the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence, a patriotic association here drafted and signed the now-famous Liberty Point Resolves.

In 1838 the United States Arsenal was built on Haymount, the grounds occupying forty acres. At the beginning of the War Between the States the Arsenal was captured by the Confederates, and here small arms were manufactured. It was completely destroyed by Sherman in March, 1865. One of the two markers there is built with some of the old foundation stones.

Fayetteville has the distinction of having two Confederate monuments. The one in Cross Creek Cemetery, erected December 30, 1868, was the first in North Caro-

lina, and one of the first in the South. The Monument on the site of the old courthouse on James Square was unveiled May 10, 1902.
