The areas of paramount achievement include National Teachers Examination scores, The Dean's Honor List, and a Research Grant from the National Science Foundation. Brother Sherry C. Spencer earned a score on the Common Examination which now is the second highest made here at FSC since the initiating of the award for highest score above 700 (given annually by Dr. M.S. Friereson).
