Placement office to sponsor new career opportunities program

The Office of Career Planning and Placement will sponsor a New Career Opportunities Program for Fayetteville State University students, Thursday, April 29, 1971. This program is designed to inform our students of the many new career opportunities now open to minority groups.

Statistics indicate that there is a preponderance of education majors graduating from predominantly black colleges and perhaps many are becoming teachers not through deliberate choice and commitment to the field of education, but ignorance of the fact that a college education might also lead to other careers that were previously limited to blacks.

The principle objective of the New Career Opportunities Program is to bring young graduates of traditionally black colleges back to their Alma Mater and to give these graduates maximum exposure to students and faculty members in order that an exchange of information about the ac-

cessibility of new career fields can take place.

Fifteen of our most recent graduates who are successfully engaged in non-traditional fields have been invited to participate. These fields include business, law, government, industries and social service agencies.

There will be a general assembly of the student body in the J. W. Seabrook Auditorium at 11:00 A.M. An abbreviated address will be given by Jack Gravely, class of 67 and a third year law student at the University of Virginia. Following this, the alumni returnees and company representatives will be introduced followed by a luncheon for participants and department heads. From 12:00-5:00 P.M. students will be able to visit alumni returnees and participating representatives in assigned rooms for the exchange of information about the accessibility of new career fields.
