

Dr. Hargrave coordinated the third summer at White Lake for special education teachers, handicapped children and provisional vocational teachers, which was hosted by Bladen County Schools. This program served as a model for multi-discipline interaction since educational, vocational, recreational and nursing representatives were involved.

Dr. Hargrave served in the Air Force from 1942-45. In 1946, he accepted the position at East Arcadia High School in Bladen County as an instructor.
