FAYETTEVILLE Dr. Robert E. Burney has been named Acting Chairman of the Division of Business and Economics and Department Chairman of Business Administration and Economics

at Fayetteville State University.

The announcement was made by Chancellor Charles "A" Lyons, Jr. of Fayetteville State University.

Burney comes to FSU from Alabama State University, Montgomery, Alabama, where he held the position of Acting Dean of the College of Business and Economics and Professor of Economics.

A native of Birmingham, Alabama, Dr. Burney received his undergraduate training at Florida A. & M. University. He is a recipient of the master's and the Ph.D. degree from Florida State University.

The announcement was made by Dr. Charles "A" Lyons, Jr., Chancellor of FSU.

An alumnus of Fayetteville State University, Dr. Hayes comes to FSU from Sampson Technical Institute, Clinton, North Carolina, where he served as Dean of Adult Education for approximately two years.

A native of Wilson, North Carolina, Hayes received the M.A. degree from New York University, and the Ph.D. degree from North Carolina State University.

His professional experiences include instructor and principal, West Hoke Elementary School, Raeford, North Carolina and has over 21 years experience in elementary education.
