Proposal Review Panelists Selected

Dr. Sydney A. Reid, Dean, Fort Bragg Center and Morris A. Blount, Title III Coordinator, were selected as panelists to assist the National Science Foundation in its review and evaluation of proposals submitted for the FY 1977 competition.

Dr. Reid served on the December 1976 panel in Washington, D.C. for the Minority Institutions Service Improvement Program (MISIP). Support for this program is provided to effect long-range improvement in the basic strength of two-and four-year institutions.

Mr. Blount will serve on the February 1977 panel in Washington, D.C. for the Comprehensive Assistance to Undergraduate Science Education Program (CAUSE). This program is designed to encourage improvement in the quality and effectiveness of undergraduate science education in two- and four-year institutions.
