

Letter to Editor

October 25, 1989 Dear Ms. Bihlmeyer:

There seems to have been some interest generated by

your initial article on the University Bookstore. I feel it is appropriate and helpful to give some facts about the Bookstore operations. First, the Bookstore at Fayetteville State University, like Bookstores on all campuses of the University of North Carolina, is an auxiliary enterprise which means it must be self-supporting. Fayetteville State University's Bookstore thrives to end each fiscal year at a break-even mode. There is no requirement or pressure to make a profit beyond what is required to cover the cost of operating the store. Second, of the total revenues generated by the Store each year, approximately forty-tour percent (44%) is attributed to the book rental program; nineteen percent (19%) to the sale of non-book items; and thirty-seven percent (37%) to the sale of books. Third, Fayetteville State University's Bookstore. like most stores in the country. receives a discount from book

companies when it buys in volume. The discount on most books is generally approximately twenty percent (20%) below the retail sale price. It has been the policy of Favetteville State University in the last fourteen (14) years to price books thirty percent (30%) above the actual cost of the books to the Bookstore. The markup is not placed on the list or retail price as suggested in the letter from

'Whitly Black". Finally, it is my hope that individuals at the University who wish to make constructive suggestions for positive changes in any operation of the Institution will find the appropriate avenue for doing so, and that individuals who desire facts about the operation of the University will seek such from the appropriate office where those facts are located. I enourage all students to seek the facts about the Bookstore and make suggestions about its operations to my office as necessary.
