## Letter to Editor

Dear Ms. Bihlmeyer:

There seems to have been some interest generated by your initial article on the University Bookstore. I feel it is appropriate and helpful to give some facts about the Bookstore operations. First, the Bookstore at Fayetteville State University, like Bookstores on all campuses of the University of North Carolina, is an auxiliary enterprise which means it must be self-supporting. Fayetteville State University's Bookstore thrives to end each fiscal year at a break-even mode. There is no requirement or pressure to make a profit beyond what is required to cover the cost of operating the store. Second, of the total revenues generated by the Store each year, approximately forty-four percent (44%) is attributed to the book rental program; nineteen percent (19%) to the sale of non-book items; and thirty-seven percent (37%) to the sale of books. Third, Fayetteville State University's Bookstore, like most stores in the country, receives a discount from book

Campus Fear . . .

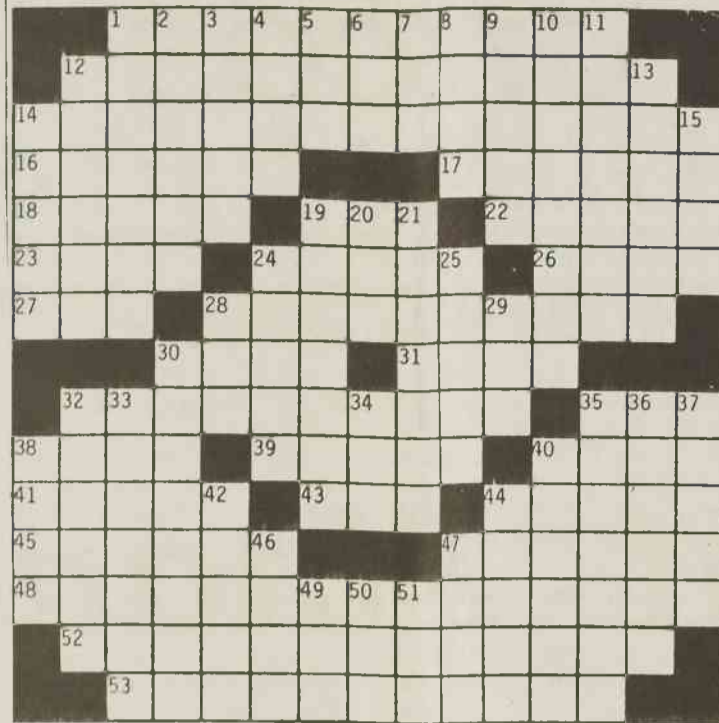

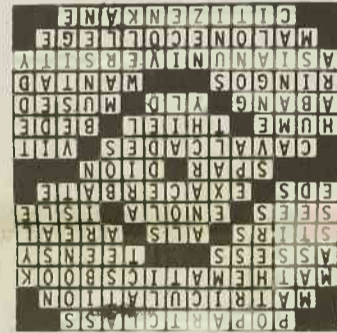
