Miss Smith, first runner-up in the student election held in April 1990, assumed the crown when the winner, Dawn Shropshire, did not return to school this semester, thereby resigning the position.

"My main objective," Miss Smith said of her new title, "is to let students know that Miss FSU is a significant part of the university. I plan to speak at upcoming events and help the university in academic recruiting. Miss FSU should be an ambassador for the university."

Miss Smith is vice-president of Kappa Delta Pi, a member of the Student Government
