

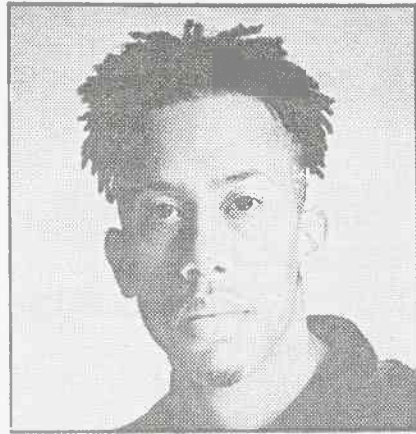
1st Mr. FSU Mounts Throne

Crockett, a Chancellor's Scholar, is a junior from Fayetteville, NC majoring in Business Administration. A member of Phi Eta Sigma Honor Society and the FSU Dance Troupe, Crockett wowed the judges and audience during the self-expression competition with a dance routine he choreographed. Zaqques Gray, SGA Program Director and a Chancellor's Scholar, was selected First Runner-Up. Jeremy Wright, a member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, was selected as Second Runner-Up. Also competing for the title were Oyango Burney, Jeremy Hollingsworth, Matthew Mercer and Eric Walker, who was selected as Most Inspirational by his fellow contestants.

The competition was sponsored by the FSU Pan-Hellenic Council. The Council thought a more formal competition patterned after the Miss FSU Pageant would be an excellent opportunity to showcase some of the many talented young men on the campus. The contestants were judged in five categories: Student Vote, Athletic Wear, Casual Wear, Self-Expression and Formal Wear.

"The Male of the 90's ... What a Man" was the theme of the competition. The contestants, with help from "The Ladies In Black", performed a show stopping opening routine to Salt and Pepper's single, "Whatta Man". Desiree McCormick, Miss Fayetteville 1992 and a student at FSU, served as Mistress of Ceremo-



nies. Ricardo Morgan served as the Master of Ceremonies for the evening.

One suspects that this is only the beginning of a future which will be filled with success, high achievement, and honor for Crockett and the other young men who participated in the competition.

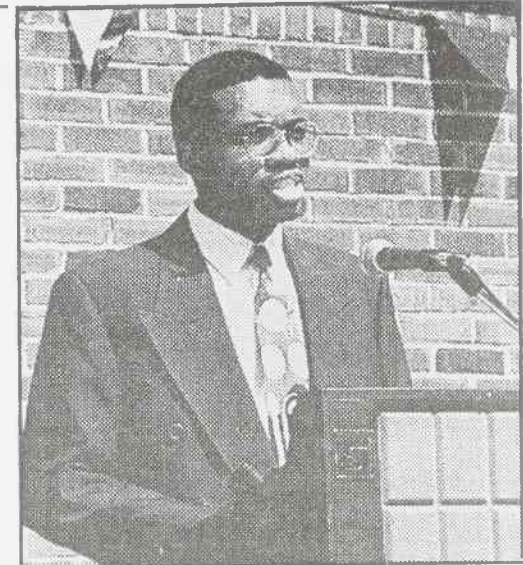
ZACQUES D. GRAY SELECTED AS S.G.A. PRESIDENT

SAFEGUARDING YOUR PROPERTY ON CAMPUS

Learn and follow all FSU security policies. They have been created out of concern for your welfare and in consideration of the rights of everyone in the campus community. The following tips are provided to assist you in safeguarding your personal property.

WHERE YOU LIVE: Keep all doors locked, day and night. Lock your door every time you leave. This is the single best deterrent to the would-be thief in the residence. Do not leave a door unlocked for a roommate or friend arriving later. If you lose your keys, report the loss immediately so the door can be rekeyed. Many thefts occur while the occupant is on the same floor, having left for a minute to visit a restroom or another room. Do not store your purse or jewelry in an unlocked desk drawer. Do not let strangers in your room or into a residence hall main access door.

AROUND CAMPUS: Engrave expensive equipment and valuables with an identification number. An engraver is available free of charge from the FSU Crime Prevention Officer. Do not leave your belongings unattended in the library, dining hall, locker room, classroom, or any public area. Never lend your keys to anyone. Someone else's carelessness or ruthlessness may be your loss.

YOUR CAR: Always lock your car and take the keys. Make sure the windows are rolled up. Never leave the keys in the ignition. Lock valuables in the trunk. Park in well lighted area.

FSU police are here to serve you. Your comments and suggestions are welcome. Remember--for an escort after dark on campus, between buildings or from a building to your car, call 486-1341 and ask for a Safe Escort.
