Beginning this fall, parking permits are now color coded hanging tags.

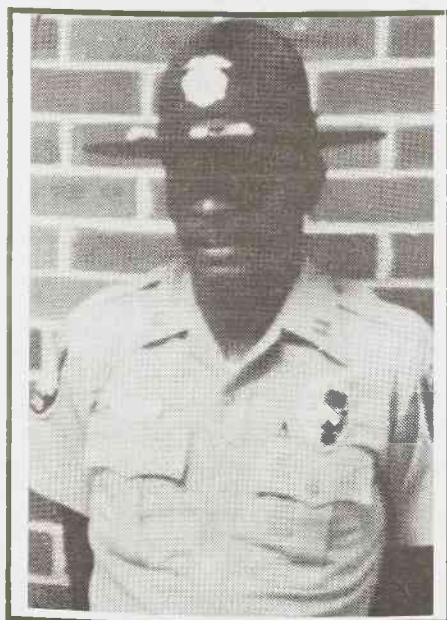
One of the major reasons for the change is convenience. No longer does one have to go through the trouble of getting a temporary sticker for multiple vehicles.

STUDENT SAFETY SQUAD ENHANCES CAMPUS SECURITY

Campus security has always been one of the primary concerns of any university administration, and FSU is no different. The tragic death of Kisha Simpson both shocked and sharpened our sensibilities to the continued need for and awareness of security. That need has been acknowledged and addressed by FSU with the creation of the FSU Student Safety Squad.

Simply put, the Student Safety Squad is a simple, cost effective way of enhancing the scope and reach of FSU's campus police. They will provide a second set of eyes and ears for campus security as well as serve as liaison for students and faculty who may be apprehensive about addressing concerns directly to uniformed officers.

In a recent interview, Willie Bell, Jr., FSU's Chief of Police, expressed both excitement and relief that the Student Safety Squad was finally off the ground. "We've been trying to get this program implemented for the past three years." This year Mr. Benson Otovo (Vice

Chancellor for Business and Finance) found a way to finance this very necessary program.

Effective September 1, the Student Safety Squad was in effect and accessible to any campus student. One of their major duties will entail providing escort service for students who use the campus after normal hours. Simply dial extension 1341 between the hours of 6:00p.m.-midnight, and a Student Safety Squad representative will be dispatched to escort you to your car, dorm, or other destination on campus.

Although the ten volunteers (Chief Bell eventually hopes to expand the Squad to twenty members) will hold paid positions and receive some training, it was emphasized that their au-

thority will not extend to physical engagement or intervention of any disturbances they might observe or encounter. Their primary function is to be and provide an extended hand, eye, and ear to campus security.
