FSU Approved for New Master's Degree

The University of North Carolina Board of Governors approved Fayetteville State University's request to award the Master of Science Degree in Criminal Justice. The approval was granted during the board's monthly meeting Feb. 10 in Chapel Hill.

The new degree program will begin in fall 2006. It is designed for students with a baccalaureate degree who wish to further their education in criminal justice at the graduate level, perhaps to establish a foundation for pursuing a doctoral degree in criminal justice or criminology. The program is also for criminal justice

professionals and researchers seeking to advance in their careers, individuals who want to teach criminal justice at the community college level, and criminal justice and social justice advocates seeking the knowledge and skills to improve the quality of justice in their communities. FSU is now accepting applications for the new program.
