## Recent suicides spark discussion

## FSU Students react to attacks against gay and lesbian students nationwide

There has been coverage over the recent suicides of six gay teens, allegedly due to excessive bullying. One of the recent stories was about Tyler Clementi, an 18 year-old college freshman at Rutgers University. Clementi was unknowingly taped having an intimate encounter with someone of the same sex on his roommate's web cam in his dorm room. Allegedly, after taping Tyler, Dharun Ravi, Tyler's roommate, went to Molly Wei's room, another freshman at Rutgers University and they broadcasted the video through live

streaming on a social networking site on September The issue here is that 19. On September 22, Clementi posted a message on Students are being his Facebook at 8:42 p.m., bullied and emotionsaying "jumping off the gw bridge sorry." A few days ally tortured because later his body was recovered of who they are just from the Hudson River.

Are there policies that are because people do in place here for students not agree with it. who have a gay/lesbian roommate and might feel uncomfortable?

At Fayetteville State University, in dorm rooms, you are allowed to have a person of the same sex spend the night with you for up to three days if you let your residence hall director/ residence hall assistant director know. Is there a way to make the dorm rules more fair regarding straight students, and gay, lesbian and bisexual students? Is there a way that students could find out if they had a gay, lesbian, or bisexual roommate before they moved in with that student? Are there any instances on campus where there has been roommate conflict because of gay/lesbian roommate issues and if so, how many?

Residence Life declined to comment for this story. However, according to procedures on the FSU website, students are encouraged to communicate with administration if any problems should arise. On Residence Life's web page, under "About Residence Life, Hall Staff Resources", this statement appears: "They are there to help with any problems you may encounter, answer questions regarding policies and procedures, and ultimately build community." Although there is no clear statement regarding straight students being paired with gay, lesbian, or bisexual students, or issues that may arise from this, there is an official complaint form under Housing Information. Students are strongly encouraged to take rational, non-violent, non-offensive actions if they feel threatened by their roommate's sexuality.

When asked how he would feel if his roommate was gay, FSU student Josh Sambula said, "I wouldn't care because it's not his fault." He was then asked if he thought that dorm rules were more beneficiary for LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender) students and he responded, "Of course it benefits them because it doesn't seem to violate visitation."

"If my roommate was gay, well I would not mind. She just better stay on her side, but other than that I would not mind," said Ashley Crabtree when asked how she'd react to being paired with a Lesbian roommate,

Mr. Sambula was also asked if a student had the right to know if their

roommate was gay and if he thought it violated their pri-

"No [students do not have a right to know about a LGBT roommate], because if their roommate wants to keep that part of their life private then it shouldn't matter as long as they're respectful and not making their roommate uncomfort-

able," he said.

Ms. Crabtree agreed, saying, "Yes [it would violate their privacy], if they want you to know then they would tell you." Josh was told that Tyler Clementi was a victim of a hate crime, and asked if he thought policies protecting LBGT students would help prevent more suicides and hate crimes. He answered, "I don't know how knowing about your roommates sexuality will prevent hate crimes and suicides."

Some students expressed that they wouldn't care if their roommate was gay, lesbian or bisexual, while others would. Do you think it's your right to know if your roommate was gay, lesbian or bisexual? Or if you are gay/lesbian or bisexual, do you think that would be a violation of your privacy? The issue here is that students are being bullied and emotionally tortured because of who they are just because people do not agree with it. As a result, hate crimes and suicides are harming and claiming the lives of innocent victims. Is it the schools obligation to protect these students?

These suicides have uncovered the horror of what can happen when bullying gets out of hand. As a result, many LGBT students and citizens have been pushing for proposals to protect them from discrimination. What are your thoughts?
