

with, and have a deeper understanding of the Registrar's Office and its problems and functions. Of Mr. Anderson he said, "I feel Wayne Community College is fortunate to have such a dedicated person. He puts in long number of hours and is not in the least hesitant to aid a student or a student activity. If I had to use one word to describe Mr. Anderson attitude toward his work it would be conscientious. I think he and Dean Waller have the students in mind at all times."

Mr. Robert Rawl, new political science instructor, has had a varied and exciting life. He received his Bachelor of Science Degree in biology and Physical Education from William and Mary College and entered the air force two weeks after graduation. He entered the flying cadet program and graduated from this program in 1941, at which time he was given a pilot rating and commissioned as second lieutenant. During World War II he served in France and England and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal with eight clusters, and the French Croix - de - guerre. After the war he served in Washington, D. C., in Air Force Headquarters with primary interest in Far Eastern Affairs. During this time he worked closely with the State Department. In 1951 he went to Lisbon, Portugal, working out of the American Embassy. From 1951-1960 he held several other important air force positions. From 1960-62 he worked in the Office of the Chief of Staff of the United States Air Force. In 1962 Mr. Rawl joined the staff of the Secretary of Defense. He worked primarily with the Assistant Secretary of Defense dealing in international security affairs. In 1963 he received a Master of Arts Degree in International Affairs from George Washington

University. In 1966 he became Air Defense Attache' to India working under Ambassador Chester Bowles. He was assigned to headquarters of the 19th Air Force at Seymour Johnson in 1969 and retired the same year as a colonel. Mr. Rawl notes that, "I feel this will be an excellent opportunity to pass on my experiences to other people."

Mrs. Nina C. Powell, new sociology instructor, will also assume her duties Fall Quarter, 1970. She holds the Bachelor of Arts and the Master of Social Work degrees, receiving the latter degree at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Mrs. Powell has had varied experience in the

field of social work, having served as a caseworker in the Childrens Home Society of North Carolina, the Veterans Administration Center, and a Public Health Investigator to name just a few. Teaching in the community college will not be new to her, however, since she has taught Japanese flower arrangement in New Mexico. In this regard she edited "Japanese Flower Arrangements for Beginners," in 1962, which was published by Charles Scribner and Son.
