

Inauguration attracts 300

inaugurated on
September 24, 1992.

Wilson.


Coles said it was a privilege to work with Dr. Wilson because Wilson is interested in the students and what they do.

Representatives from 32 colleges and community colleges attended.

Trumpeter Bill Jones and organist Roger Searles preformed the Prelude, "Trumpet Concerto in D," and the hymn "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee." They also performed the processional and recessional accompaniment.

William F. Simpson, Chairman of the State Board of Community Colleges, administered the Oath of Office, and Jack Kannan presented Wilson the President's Medallion, a symbol of power and authority passed on to each new president.

Throughout the ceremony the speakers conveyed pride for the beautiful new buildings on the campus, the increased enrollment,


and new academic programs in place at WCC as the quarter begins.
