Ethel and Norman Thayer are an elderly couple spending their summer vacation on Golden Pond.

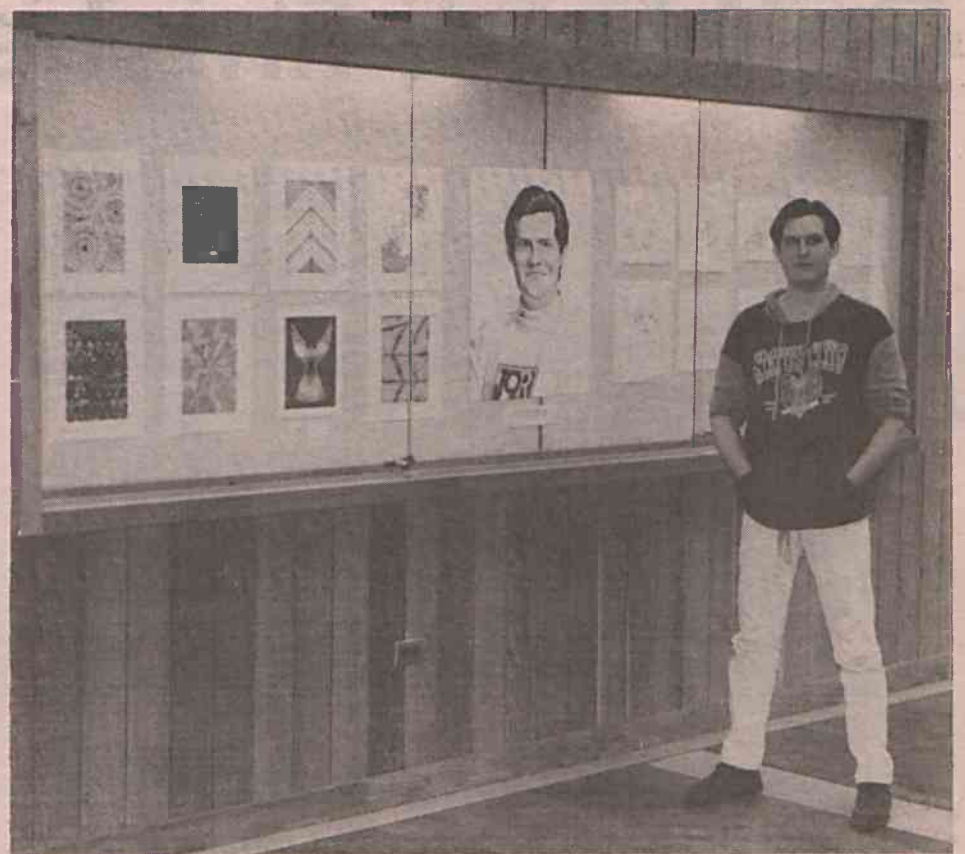
The producer was JoAnn Bruce and the Assistant Director was Ray Brannon.

You have just finished studying for your Chemistry II test, and you decide to look over your transfer information to make sure you haven't missed anything, but sure enough, you have!

You realize that you're going to have to take Chemistry III because the college you are transferring to is on a semester system.

To meet MAR you must take 9 quarter hours of the following classes: English, math, science, and social science, or earn an Associate of Arts degree.
