Fred Sproul.


Sound effects and lighting were managed by Paul Duke.

MAR can be achieved in high school if you have taken the necessary courses to enter a 4-year institution right out of high school.

Unfortunately, some of us unlucky ones were unable to achieve these credentials.

We have come to WCC first to take those courses.

To meet MAR you must take 9 quarter hours of the following classes: English, math, science, and social science, or earn an Associate of Arts degree.

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
