Anne Millington, Job Director, organized the event.

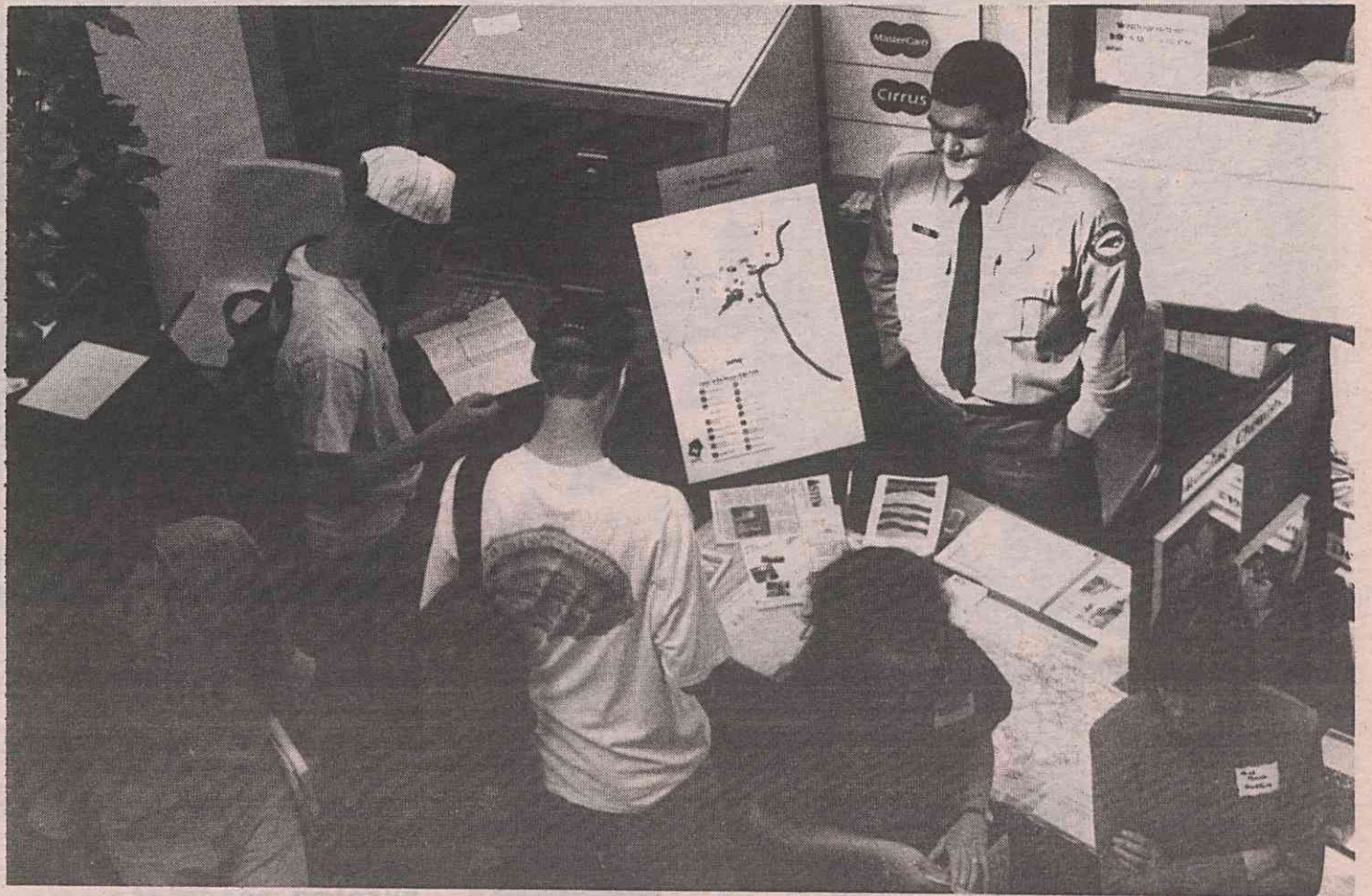
Wellness Day offered new exhibit

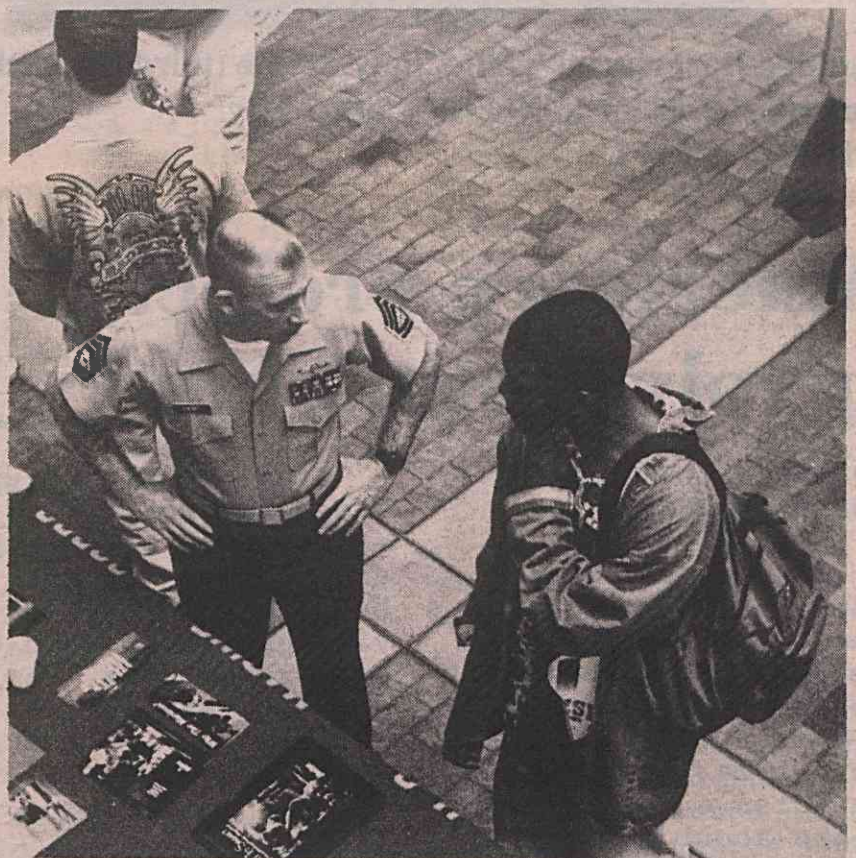
A Forest Service employee stands ready to answer questions about careers in the service as students scan brochures. PHOTO: JILL TOOLE
