

New Faces At WCC

SGA Convention



Enrollment To Exceed 1500

Total enrollment at Wilkes Community College for the Fall Quarter now stands at a record number of 1,132 curriculum students. Enrollment is expected to increase to some 3,500 students. This number will only represent those enrolled in curriculum studies on the campus in Westwood Hills, Wilkesboro, and will not include extension students taking courses at other points or adult education classes.

The full time equivalency enrollment now stands at 1,192, but is expected to exceed 1,600. This increase is the complete enrollment: curriculum students, adult education programs—community schools in various locations and continuing education classes, extension programs, and all other opportunities provided by the college to the public. The full time equivalency is determined by the number of hours taken by students enrolled.

With registration completed, the Fall Quarter classes are now in process. The college offers on its campus two years of regular college work, two years in technical subjects, and one-year vocational courses.
