VETERAN'S CLUB NEWS

The Veteran's Club has had a rise in activity. More than 85 Vets attended the last general meeting held at the Holiday Inn during the last quarter. The Veterans Affairs Coordinator, Mr. Mac Warren, gave a brief report on some of the benefits available to the eligible veteran and followed it by a question and answer period. Although not all the problems were squared, the road was paved for further future discussion.

During the meeting, an idea was proposed to establish a fund which would aid a needy fellow veteran with a loan to pay his matriculation fee and book costs until he starts receiving his VA check. This loan is not intended as a gift and is expected to be repaid as soon as the veteran possibly can so as to help another veteran. Submitted to a vote of the general council, the idea was unanimously approved. Each willing veteran was to contribute at least one dollar to the fund during registration for the Spring Quarter. Although cooperation was expected from as least 80 vets (from the meeting), a sum of over \$400 was collected! Putting the money to work, about eleven veterans were helped. However, it must be noted that this Fund is apart and separate from the treasury of the Associated Veterans Club of Wilkes Community College. More information concerning the Veterans' Fund will be given during the next general meeting early next month.

Also, a move was started to revise the constitution of the club and eventually a committee was formed composed of the following members: Mr. Robert Johnston faculty co-sponsor; Mr. Mac Warren - Veterans Affairs co-ordinator - co-sponsor; Frank R. A question was brought to the attention of the Veterans Affairs office as to who are eligible members of the Club. The answer is that all registered full-time, ¾ time, ½ time, cooperative, apprenticeship/OJT, farm cooperative, active duty, or less than half-time correspondence and flight veterans may be members. Also, the widows, wives, and children attending under V.A. benefits are eligible for membership. Encouraged to attend meetings on a non-voting status are the alumni of WCC and faculty.

Presently the Club is involved in clarifying the benefits for which the veteran is eligible, and establishing a liaison between the Club and the Veterans of Foreign Wars of Wilkes County. We hope to establish this liaison in the near future.

The next general meeting will be held again at the Holiday Inn at 7 p.m. on Friday, April 4. The date is still pending, but notices will be mailed out and posted around the WCC student bulletin. During this meeting, a draft of the Veterans Club constitution will be presented for approval, there will be nominations for next year's officers, and we'll hopefully have a speaker from the Winston-Salem V.A. Office. Also on the agenda will be a breakdown of the newly established Veterans Fund, the state of the Veterans Club Treasury, and other items of importance.
