Nathan Ward's Mom gave similar advice to always "Reach for your dreams."

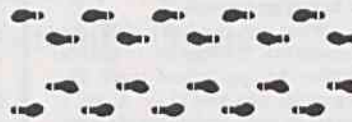
Suzanne Curtis has a perfectionist Mom that states "If you're not gonna do it right, don't do it at all."
