Coming Soon: McAlister's Deli ! By: Lacie Lyon



He told how during the years leading to World War II, his family was being treated worse and worse. He told how one of his old family friends in the United States had to sign an affidavit, saying that they would get jobs and not be a burden to the U.S. When he later became an American citizen, he joined the infantry. Despite having a slight case of polio, he still wanted to pay back the ones who oppressed him. He was a man who was truly grateful for being in this country.

This trip was well enjoyed by the students, and hopefully this taught everyone something about how people can overcome such treacherous obstacles to achieve a better place in life.
