Miss Rhoades, assisted by the College Chorus, conducted the meeting of the Christian Associations last week in Memorial Hall. It was a service commemorative of All Souls' Day; subject, "Remembrance of Great and Good." The service began with a stanza of *Coronation*, after which the leader read a Scripture lesson. Then followed an anthem sung by the Chorus, "Let Us Now Praise Famous Men."

The names chosen for recall by the members of the Chorus were the following:

HEROES OF NATIONS.

For the founding of England as a nation, its law, its government, and its navy—*Alfred the Great*.

For his acceptance of responsibility, his rectitude of purpose, and the creation of our national government—*George Washington*.

SCIENTISTS.

For his conception of Universal Gravitation—*Sir Isaac Newton*.

For his conception of Natural Selection—*Charles Darwin*.

INVENTORS.

For the invention of the printing press, which has established continuity with the life of all humanity—*John Gutenberg*.

For his discovery of the identity of lightning and electricity; for his share in the establishment of American Independence; and for his contribution to American letters—*Benjamin Franklin*.

For applying steam to navigation—the invention of the steamboat—*Robert Fulton*.

STATESMEN.

For his determined efforts for the elevation of the laboring classes in England—*William E. Gladstone*.

For the humane heart of him—*Abraham Lincoln*.

ARTIST.

For his sublime and stupendous achievements as a sculptor, architect and painter; for his love for Vittoria Colonne; and for his exquisite poetry—*Michael Angelo*.

MUSICIAN.

For his creative power, unique and unapproachable; and for the simplicity and majesty of his musical expression—*Beethoven*.

MORAL LEADERS.

For surrendering himself to the movement of Christianity; and for establishing it as a universal religion—*St. Paul*.

EDUCATORS.

For his belief in the improbability of mankind through education; and for his life's work in its furtherance—*Horace Mann*.

For founding the Society of Friends; for exacting pure and humane conduct in personal, civic and national life—*George Fox*.

For the consecration of his life to the cause of education in gener-

al, and for his ambition and accomplishment of large things for us in particular—*Charles D. McIver*.

POETS AND WRITERS.

For his share in the intellectual development of Greece; for his influence on Greek art and character; and for the noblest and purest poetry in the world—*Homer*.

For his simplicity and his tenderness—*Robert Burns*.

For his belief in happiness and joy; for his sane and sweet uplift of our spirits—*Robert Louis Stevenson*.

For teaching us the gospel of self-reliance—*Ralph Waldo Emerson*.

For his inimitable expression of the lowly life about us, and for the joyous influence of his life while among us—*John Charles McNeil*.

Mr. Strayhorn sang Robert Louis Stevenson's well known *Requiem* in a sympathetic and beautiful manner; the chorus sang Beethoven's *Worship of God in Nature*; the leader spoke a few words on the purpose and privilege of our Thursday evening meetings and the service closed with the singing of Old Hundredth and Benediction.
