"We may feel sure that thinking peonot see our colleges and universities decline for lack of funds or on account of antiquated systems education. One proposed remedy is the establishment of junior colleges to take care of those just starting to college. Another is the extension of high school to make it cover the first two years of the college course. There is a growing tendency favor of the high-school work in this manner, and, if it is adopted twice the present number of students can finish their education at college with out making the colleges any larger than they are today."—Exchange.
