goal about four hundred thousand dollars, to be raised as soon as possible. The endowment thus raised will be used to establish the financial standing of the college and to maintain or increase the support of the teachers unless otherwise specified by the donors.

The campaign committee is composed of members of the board of trustees, of the alumni association, the advisory committee and of the faculty of the college.

President Binford presented several matters to the meeting upon which he wanted advice, and, by the use of diagrams, showed how that in the past twenty years the college had increased the income of the college and raised the salary schedule. He also showed that during the first eight years of the same period the preparatory department had been the larger part of the college, then for the next eight years the two had run about parallel, while in recent years the college department has shown a marked tendency to eliminate entirely the preparatory department.

The business of the afternoon session was concluded early in the afternoon. The special committees on campaign went into session immediately and for some time worked on plans for action. Following this the whole group, at least as many as could stay, were entertained at tea on the porch of Founders' Hall.
