

NEW CONSTITUTION IS DRAWN UP BY MEN'S A.A. GROUP

Committee Composed of McDonald, Overman and Prof. Newlin; New Document.

MEN STUDENTS WILL VOTE

Constitution as Presented Contains Five Articles Concerning All Phases of Sport and Business of Association.

The Men's Athletic Association recently appointed a committee composed of Jas. McDonald, Thell Overman and Professor Newlin to draw up a constitution for the group to replace the rather vague rules that the association had been using for the past few years. The new constitution will be voted on by the men students in the very near future. The constitution to be submitted follows:

Constitution for Guilford College's Men's Athletic Association

1. The Guilford College Men's Athletic Association shall be composed of all men students in the institution.

2. It shall be the purpose of this association to promote interest in athletics on the college campus and to assist the department of physical education in carrying out a program of intramural athletics in all sports. It shall assist in the promotion of inter-collegiate athletics in the major sports: football, baseball, basketball, track, cross country, and tennis.

3. The officers of this association shall be a president, vice-president, and secretary.

4. The officers shall be elected annually at the regular student elections, from candidates nominated by the athletic council, or nominated in other ways provided for by the Student Affairs Board.

5. The manager of each sport shall be selected by the council from candidates who have served for two years as assistants in that particular sport. If no assistant is eligible, the council shall select a manager from the members of the association. The manager of each sport shall select his own assistants on the approval of the council, naming new assistants each year.

6. There shall be a captain of the varsity team for each sport. He shall be elected by a majority vote, in a secret ballot, by all the members who have earned letters in that particular sport. The election shall take place between the time of awarding letters and the closing of the school year. In case the total vote is evenly divided between two candidates, the two shall serve as co-captains during the ensuing season.

III.

1. The Athletic Council shall be composed of the President, Vice-President, and Secretary of the Men's Athletic Association, the managers and captains of all major sports sponsored by this A.A., and members of the Faculty Committee on Athletics. The officers of the A.A. shall act as officers of the Council.

2. The jurisdiction of the council shall be: the selection of manager, awarding of the letters, and the determination of policies for the A.A. It shall also be the duty of the Council to call general meetings of the Men's A.A. when, in the opinion of the Council, it is deemed necessary.

3. It shall be the duties of the members of this council to promote good sportsmanship in all athletic activities on the campus and promote a spirit of hospitality towards visitors on the Guilford campus.

4. The meeting of the Council shall be called after each season of sports, fall, winter, and spring, by the President of the Association or by petition signed by five members of the Council. Notices of meetings of the Council shall be sent to all members by the Secretary two days in advance of the time set for the meeting.

IV.

1. Any player who is to receive a letter in football must have played at least 40 per cent of the quarters played by the team during the current year.

2. Any player who is to receive a letter in basketball must participate in at least one-half of the total halves played. 2a. To receive credit for a half he must play at least ten minutes in that game.

3. Any player who is to receive a letter in baseball must appear at bat at

FACULTY MEMBERS SPEAK THROUGHOUT STATE

Widely Varying Topics Will Be Under Discussion During the Coming Weeks.

PUSH-OFF SPEECHES DOMINANT

Commencement addresses are scheduled by at least three members of the Guilford College faculty, Dr. Clyde A. Milner, Ernestine Milner, and Dr. A. D. Beittel.

Dr. Milner's engagement include at least six commencement addresses and two baccalaureate addresses. His first scheduled address is on the evening of April 18 and his last on the evening of June 2.

Mrs. Milner has a commencement speech at Faison April 26. In addition she will speak on April 19 to the Ray Street P.-T. A. High Point on the subject, "The Family Today"; on April 30 on the subject of social studies at the state meeting of the A. A. U. W.; and on May 5 at the Mother and Daughter banquet in the Asheboro Street Friends church in Greensboro.

Dean Beittel will speak to the seniors at the Gibsonville high school on May 11.

For the past few days Dr. E. G. Purdom has been visiting various high schools in North Carolina and meeting with the senior classes. Schools visited thus far are: Morganton, High Point, Winston-Salem, and Greensboro, Coach Smith accompanied him to Greensboro. Dr. Purdom gave a demonstration-lecture on phases of science at the Bessemer and Gibsonville high schools. He also addressed the senior class in Bessemer. Dr. Purdom expects to visit every high school in Guilford county before May 1.

least one and one-half times the number of games played, i.e., 30 times for 20 games. A relief pitcher who wins will receive credit for a complete game.

4. To receive a letter in track a contestant must take part in every meet of the season and must average at least two points per meet.

5. To receive a letter in cross country a man must participate in all meets and must finish among the first five of his own team in at least one meet. In case a member of the team is physically unable to participate in every meet and meets other requirements for a letter, the Council shall decide whether or not the letter shall be awarded.

6. Each member of the tennis team must participate in at least three-quarters of the matches played and win 40 per cent of that total in order to receive a letter.

7. Any manager, to receive a manager's letter, must have rendered three years of efficient service in that sport. One of these three years of service may have been as a player in that particular sport.

8. Additional letters may be awarded on the recommendation of the coach by a two-thirds majority vote of the Council and of the team for any sport.

V.

Amendments:

1. Proposal to amend this Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the Athletic Association (a) when approved by the Council or (b) when in the form of a petition signed by 25 members of this association.

2. Ratification: Such proposed amendments or changes shall become effective when approved by two-thirds vote of the members of the Men's Athletic Association in a general meeting.
