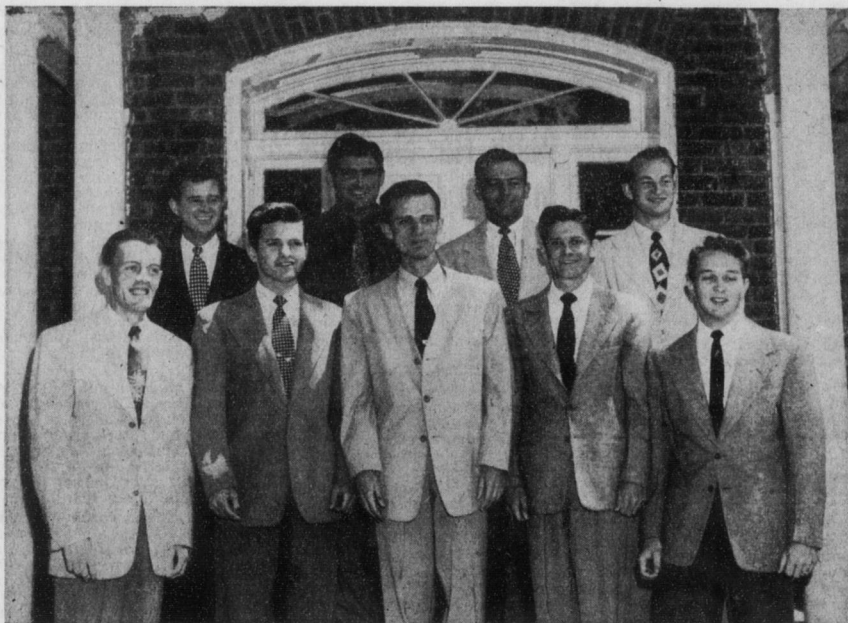

Development Fund Approaches Mark Set as Goal in 1944

The second unit of the campus development program was introduced in 1947, Dr. Milner said, and reached the proposed maximum subscription of \$200,000 a year later.

He said \$100,000 of this will go toward permanent endowment of the library and \$100,000 to library additions. These additions, expected to be finished in the near future, provide additional reading room, office space, and space for housing the Quaker Historical and Carnegie Art and Music collections.

The final unit of the development program, introduced last January, is on its last lap. Funds raised in this campaign will, as was explained, go toward the chapel and "inadequate" Memorial Hall.

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
