From 1934 to 1954 he has guided the steady growth and progress of the school to where we stand today. 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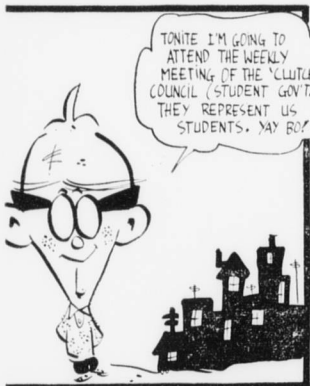
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
