

Dr. Williams graduated from Guilford College in the class of 1921. Her father was pastor of the New Garden Friends Meeting. Prior to coming to Guilford, Dr. Williams was director of the Lynn Home for Aged Woman in Lynn, Mass; before this she taught astronomy at Smith College.

Dr. Williams plans to have the Student Union open from nine in the morning to nine-fifty in the evening. To do this either she or a student helper will have to be in the building all the time. She also mentioned that one of the purposes of the Student Union is to have a place for day students to go between classes. The soda fountain, operated by Gordon Haight and Eugene White, will be open from 11:30-1:30, 5:30-7:30 and 9:00-9:50. Sandwiches, coffee, ice-cream, and sodas will be served.

Dr. Williams hopes that it can be arranged so that the book store will be open all the time. As well as text books, books on consignment from a store in Greensboro will be available.
