Every year around Easter time there is a sudden influx of golfing enthusiasts to the Greensboro area. The reason, of course, is that at this time they will have one of their few chances to see some of the greatest names in golf in action at the Greater Greensboro Open at Sedgefield.

It must be tough on a young golfer playing his first G.G.O., in the company of such greats and large crowds, to do well. But at the most recent G.G.O., a few weeks ago, one did do well. His name is Jim Stephens. He's a Junior here at Guilford and number one man on the current Golf team,

Jim finished second in the amateur division of the Tournament behind veteran Bob Loy, Jr., who played his college golf several years ago at Elon. Jim's seventy-two hole total of 297 (74-73-76-74) was five off Loy's final 292.

Considering that it was his first G.G.O., and that he has only been in two other big tournaments before, Jim did remarkably well.

Stephens has also won the consolation championship of the Carolinas Junior Golf Tournament (1960) and came in second in the High Point Enterprise Classic

This finish puts Jim Stephens among the top North Carolina amateurs and makes him a top contender for the Carolinas Conference Championship at Boone later in May.
