Baseball to open season March 2

By Fred Pavalko Guilford's baseball team opens its 1981 season at home this year with a doubleheader on March 2, against Longwood College. The Quakers are com-ing off a 14-12 season in 1980 which was their best since going 20-16 back in 1977

Head Coach Stewart Maynard will have five seniors returning this year including ace pitcher Johnny Hodges who last year mounted a 4-3 record along with an impressive 2.06 ERA against some of Guilford's

toughest competition

The Quakers will be without last years leading hitter and standout catcher Barry Bailiff who graduated last spring. Coach Maynard says he will miss the services of Bailiff but hopes that players such as freshman William Chris Morgan who hit a red hot .484 in 13 games this past fall will be able to help counter the loss. During those 13 games, Guilford mounted a 5-5-3 record. Among other standouts this past fall was a

transfer from N.C. State, Harlie Miller, senior outfielder David Clay, John Wilcox and Todd Roberts who all hit over .320.

Maynard, who now has only two sure starting pitchers in Hodges and Jan Richardson, says he is still looking to fill three other starting spots.

Hopefully, the beginning of the season will see the school's new scoreboard up and in use. This is a season which holds high hopes for Maynard and the players of his 29 man roster.

Men win 1, drop 2

The Guilford men's basketball team ended the week with a victory at home against Atlantic Christian and two losses on the road at the hands of Lenoir Rhyne and High Point as their record fell to 12-13.

On Monday night in Hickory N.C., Wayne Freeman's 34 point performance was the only bright spot as the Quakers were routed 81-67 by Lenoir Rhyne. The Bears, behind 69% shooting from the floor, took a 42-29 half-time advantage. Guilford could get no closer than 10 in the second half in losing their twelveth Lenoir Rhyne's record improved to 12-8.

The Quakers returned to Ragan-Brown Field House on Wednesday night to hand Atlantic Christian a 77-62 thrashing. Guilford's man-to-man defense in the first half proved to be devastating to the clearly inferior ACC team, as the Quakers mounted a 41-25 halftime lead. Guilford's play in the second half fluctuated as they gained a 21 point lead only to be outscored 21-2 in one stretch, reducing he margin to 13. Postell Seymour led the Quakers with 23 points. Ben Barrett and Wayne Freeman added 19 and 17 points, respectively in helping to hand ACC its seventeenth loss of the year in 25

At High Point on Saturday night, Guilford remained close to the wire, but could not overcome the Panthers, accepting a 50-46 defeat. The Quakers saw their last chance elude them with 7 seconds remaining as Anthony Parrish's missed free throw attempt took a High Point bounce. Bruce Floyd High Point came away with the rebound, and Parrish, who was fouled again in the process, made good on two free throws to provide the margin of victory. Postnell Seymour scored 14 points, and Wayne Freeman and Sporty Jeralds added ten each as Guilford fell to fourth place in the Carolinas Conference with a 6-6 record. High Point moved into second place
