Bertram, Tracy led the team in scoring and assists while defensive backs Whitaker and Thur plus Benbow the goalkeeper, helped keep the opponents to as many goals as Tracy and Bertram scored together.

The majority of the team were Freshmen and second year players who all have an incredible abilty to learn the game and have promising potential. Defensively, Claire Bresnihan dominated the center with consistent aggressive attacks and phenomenal ball control.
