James was the chair of the committee last year and was in large part responsible for a number of improvements, including the waffle makers and the woks being placed in the cafeteria. James will be up for approval at the January 27 meeting.

Another personnel addition

Another personnel addition took place last week with the approval, as expected, of Rob Kusch as Special Projects chair and Meredith Shea as Community Relations co-chair. Both positions were left vacant by resigna-

tions at the end of the first semester.

Preparations for the Student Loan Fund Auction continue. Auction Committee chair Michael Pruden reported that phone calls to businesses have begun and are proceeding well.

The phone bank in New Garden Hall has been reserved for the next two weeks, and volunteers are being gathered to place calls to area businesses.
