An architect, a musician, a minister, a leader of an intentional community—Bill Rogers entertained all of these ideas when contemplating his career when he was growing up. Never did he anticipate becoming a college president.

After sixteen years though, Bill is somewhat sad to see it ending. He describes these years as the most important period of his life.
