New caf director has lofty goals

Last week, posters all over campus asked the question, "Tired of the caf, already?" Brad McNeely's job is to insure that your answer is "No." As Guilford's new cafeteria manager, McNeely is responsible for providing menus and giving students more of what they want.

The job isn't necessarily an easy one. Of the money students pay each semester to attend Guilford, only \$1,242.00 per student goes towards food service, according to the *Enrollment Handbook*. Despite the fairly small budget, McNeely has lofty goals. He wants to provide students with more variety and better food. He says students at Guilford have a new cafeteria director because, "They needed one... Guilford got stuck in a rut."

McNeely's goal is to change the cafeteria and his first priority is to improve the quality of the

Art Gallery to hold Scanga exhibition

Internationally-acclaimed artist Italo Scanga will display more than forty of his most recent paintings at an exhibition at the Art Gallery.

The exhibition will remain on view through Tuesday, September 23, weekdays from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. and Sundays from 2-5 p.m.

Born in Calabria, Italy, Scanga is a prolific artist that works in the full spectrum of media. His paint-

ings on display at Guilford will include "Cubism," a small painting in jewel tones of blue, red and gold, combining images representing an African sculpture, a fractured goblet and an Italian cypress tree.

Scanga is Professor of Fine Arts at the University of California, San Diego. He immigrated to the United States in 1946, at the age of fourteen, and his work has been included in more than two hundred solo and group exhibitions.
