Don McNemar, in a letter to the Guilford College community, wrote "Everyone in the community has ideas and experience to contribute, and I am urging the task forces to consult you both formally and informally."

Greensboro can require structural changes such as electrical and plumbing repairs when work begins on the kitchen.

The initial Hobbit reaction was angry. Signs even went up on the front door of the dorm registering Hobbit complaints. As second-year-Hobbit Cam Eubanks said "We take care of our messes. So we don't need new carpet and furniture all the time. I understand this year, because so much money was put into other things but we've been ignored if you look at the history of things. We've been cleaning that carpet for years.

Workchecker Allison Mower pointed out that the school is saving money on Hobbs but not willing to invest any into it: "Do the math. We work 2 hours a week multiply by minimum wage... but we only save \$60 a semester.'

Other Hobbits also mentioned the new technology put in place over the summer: "They spent all this money putting in little silver boxes in the rooms but afford to use our cafe but they

don't spend the money on it." said Jamie Brown

Many students who live in other dorms feel Hobbits are whining and already have a better dorm than do they. Eubanks' response was "We're not angry anymore. It's an issue of equality on campus and we're not just bitching."

Currently Hobbits are working to raise money from Hobbs alumnae. Mary Hobbs Hall Council President Shivangee Dalal said she had spoken with Leslie Daisy from Institutional Advancement about establishing a Mary Hobbs Restoration Fund.

Many Hobbits feel that the fund-raising process is bringing them closer to one another but they worry about the long term negative effects on the Hobbs and Guilford Communities.
