Some also worry that the membership of the task forces is not representative enough of the faculty as a whole to make good decisions. As mentioned before, Kathy Tritschler worries about the fate of her department.

"My biggest concern is that the area of sports studies is so poorly understood as an academic disciplne by the vast majority of my colleagues," said Tritschler. "People who do not fully understand a department or program are going to have a hard time finding the right place for them in the curriculum."

Groves feels that even though the criteria for task force membership stated that the task forces would be "inclusive," dissenters have been left out. "Faculty members perceived as critical were excluded. When you exclude the critics of a process from the process, people who have the most serious questions are not given a structured way to particpate."

Most of the dissenters, even with the concerns they are expressing, want to cooperate.

"A lot of us who are critical of the process and deeply concerned about the level of faculty cuts are still trying to work as contructively as possible with the process," said Groves.
