New purchasing director hired

Tracy A. Hall will begin as Director of Purchasing on December 15. Hall comes to Guilford from Polo/Ralph Lauren, where she has worked since 1989.

Hall fills a position which has been troubled since Dawn Atkins left it last year. Atkins returned to Guilford this fall, filling in part time since her successor, Steve Crompton, left over the summer.

Hall will be in charge of all purchases made by Guilford on behalf of academic departments, student organizations, and other sectors of the College, including facilities. While in college, she headed emergency security dispatch program at Franklin Pierce, scheduling and training 25 students as well as working with police, fire, and emergency medical personnel.
