Restructure, cont'd from page 1 ducted by faculty opposed to McNemar's plan demonstrated the likelihood that the faculty would likely decrease by 15% over two years through natural attrition. If the remaining faculty covered the departures through "creative adaptation," perhaps more direct cuts could be avoided.

Now the task force has been disbanded, and the decision-making has passed into other hands. Kathy Adams is a member of the advisory committee on departmental review which is reviewing the suggestions of the task force.

"The purpose of the committee is to design a departmental review process," said Adams.

In fact, the committee is work-

ing on a process that would use the existing annual report and would include an annual review of the departments' goals. Those documents would then be employed in a five-year review of each department. The goal of this review is to identify strengths and problem areas of departments.

Restructuring is a delicate process. When departments are moved or become obsolete, professors' jobs, as well as students' majors, are at stake.

For this reason, Adams feels that the review is a more humane way to handle the necessary confrontation of these issues.

"Change is always hard, but the best way to do it is to get everybody involved in that change together to talk about it, seeing if it can work," Adams said.

The student representative to the Facilities Committee, Steve Karakasidis, stated that he had very little information about the proposal. "Our main emphasis on the committee has been on the science center," said Karakasidis.

Reactions from students varied

on the proposal to expand Founders. "I would like to see an additional setting to eat in in the new wing so that it would give us some diversity and choices in our eating," said firstyear student Veronica McNeill. Other students, however, felt that there was no need for the proposed wing.

"They're destroying the nice scenery by building another wing," said first-year student Wendy Lam. "It's a nice area as it is, and there are already enough things inside
