Board of Trustees leaves outsourcing to McNemar, raises tuition; sets new vision

year. A double room will cost \$2,960 a year.

To make sure there will be adequate housing, the restrictions on letting seniors live off campus will be eased somewhat. Currently a senior must be 23 years old or have 80 credits by the middle of their junior year to petition to live off campus.

Those restrictions are being lowered to 22 and 78 respectively. "All of those changes are aimed at giving juniors and seniors more options for housing," said Olds.

Changes will also take effect in the meal plan. A new sevenmeal plan will be introduced with \$100 dollars of munchie money. This plan, which originated in the Student Residence Council, is designed for students who wish to do more of their own cooking. SRC also looked at the possibility of a 14-meal plan.

However, Olds stated that she, along with other administrators, were not aware of the popularity of that idea and did not discuss it with the Chief Financial Officer Art Gillis. Therefore, the plan did not come up before

the trustees.
