





big ones.


A couple weeks ago, President Don

President, Vice President, Treasurer, and
Secretary, respectively. Running uncontested
doesn't seem to bother them, though. "If somebody else was really
interested, they would've formed a ticket,"
said Bloodworth.

Dawn Watkins, Director of Student
Activities, is very excited about the ticket.
She is looking forward to working with them.
"[Union] had a strong year of events with
strong chairs. We're going to try to get the

entire group working together rather than
individually next year," said Watkins.

Even though the ticket formed at the
last minute (the petition deadline was ex-

spring after returning from Guadalajara.

Simmons and James have both attended
Union events but have not been members of Union.

of activities," said Bloodworth. "We want to

latino bands we bring to campus. There's
also been a decrease in the amount of movie
tickets and outings and we want to increase
