March 1 - Election rules informational meeting

If you submitted a ballot on Feb. 28, then you are required to come to this meeting. No one can begin campaigning until they have met with the current Vice President to hear the rules and future forum dates.

March 28 - The Big Day. That's right, the election (7 a.m. - 7 p.m.)

After all your work from Spring Break to

March 28, you hopefully will have gained a support base of students who will elect you. But make sure you aren't in the building except to eat and vote; otherwise, you could be disqualified.

March 29 - Election results are final at 7 p.m.

Any student can contest the results up to 24 hours after they are announced.

So, fancy yourself a Vice President? Secretary? Treasurer? Or the Big Kahuna? Then go for it. Find a group of students who are currently in good judicial standing with a GPA of 2.0 or higher and pick up a ballot form at the Info Desk. ☼

Some students don't think Guilford should have a yearbook at all.

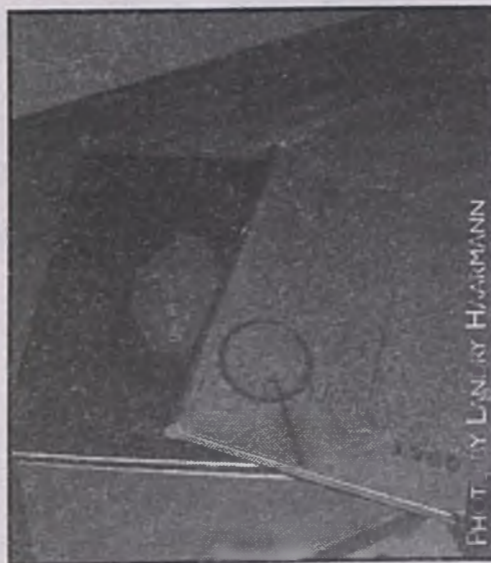
"They just seem like a high school thing," said first-year Alex Barnett. "It just seems like there's a distance between students at colleges. I won't care about half the things in my yearbook."
