

## Le Cercle Francais Invites Membership

New students, old students, and faculty members—in short, all who have studied or are studying French—are extended herewith a cordial invitation to become members of *Le Cercle Francais*. The club needs the support of everyone who is eligible for membership and there is no doubt but that it will prove of benefit to those who avail themselves of the privilege of belonging.

The organization is still in its infancy, having been called into existence about two years ago when representatives from the language department felt that there was a need for practice in speaking the French language and in hearing it spoken, which need could not properly be looked after in the overcrowded class rooms and short periods. The French Club resulted, and its purpose, according to the constitution, is to develop fluency in speaking the French language. By this end, programs are prepared, including games, songs, plays, current information, and talks by native speakers—all in French, for French is the only language allowed at the club meetings.

If one has dramatic ability, there is a splendid chance to develop by participation in the plays presented at intervals. If one is a would-be linguist, there is ample chance for beneficial practice. If one would wish to know something concerning French customs and peculiarities, there are talks concerning these from time to time. And, best of all, if one would wish to enter the social life of the college more fully, the French Club has the opportunity of getting acquainted and making friends, for at the

close of each meeting there is a social hour during which the members play music games, most of them peculiarly French; sing French songs; and oftentimes have tea after the special meetings.

The qualifications for membership do not include that the applicant must be a language major. All a willingness to cooperate. All students enrolled in the French department are eligible; faculty members are invited and welcomed. The aim is to have everyone in the department enrolled and active in the Club.

The president for this year is Tabba Reynolds, member of the class of '25.

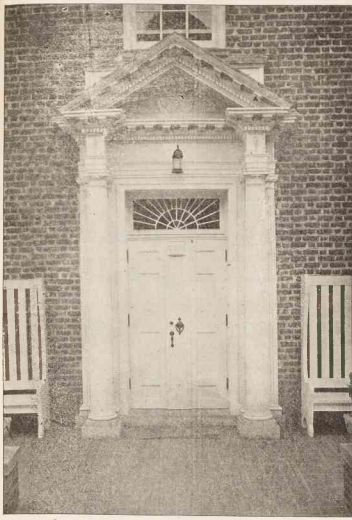
## Miss Sarah Shaffner Dies on August 14th

On the afternoon of August 14, about 2:30 o'clock, Miss Sarah E. Shaffner died at the Sisters Home in Salem. She had been in ill health for several months and her death was not unexpected. Her age was seventy-nine years.

Miss Shaffner, known familiarly to the students of Salem as "Miss Sallie," was for about fifty years a member of the faculty of the college, specializing in the study of history, and she was beloved by many students who were numbers in her classes. For the past several years she has been the editor of the *Lianne Record*.

It is indeed a coincidence that her sister, Miss Louisa Shaffner, also for many years a teacher at the college, died just one year before the date of Miss Sallie's death.

Miss Shaffner is survived by two nephews, H. F. Shaffner and W. F. Shaffner, both of Winneto, Salem, and one, Miss Lillian Shaffner.

## Regulations From College Catalogue

We are quoting below extracts from the college catalogue relating to program of studies, classification of students, etc.:

Page 72—*Program of Studies*—“No student registering in Salem College or any department school will be allowed to take less work than will total fifteen points, nor more than will total seventeen points during any semester, without the consent of the faculty.”

Page 72—*Classification of Students*—“Each student must have the following minimum number of points to her credit before she may enter the next higher class:

Freshman — 20 points  
Sophomore — 30 points  
Junior — 50 points

No student will be admitted to the Sophomore Class who has not received all entrance conditions. No student will be admitted to the Junior Class who has not completed the Freshman required work. No student will be admitted to the Senior Class who has not completed the Sophomore required work.

There will be no reclassifications within the college year except by vote of the faculty and then only at mid-year on the removal of conditions.

Page 72—*Regulations Concerning Summer School Credit*—“Not more than six points of college credit will be granted for work done in any one summer school of six weeks duration. Certificates from the Summer School must be presented before the credit will be given. Approval of the head of the department at Salem College as to the credit for the course must be obtained before enrolling in the Summer School. The right to attend a student on work presented at Summer School is reserved.

Not more than two semester-hours credit will be allowed for any six weeks Summer School course (taken five or six hours weekly) except in cases where the student has received a grade of D or F, such course may be approved as fulfilling the requirement for three semester-hours credit.”

Page 73—*Regulations Concerning Class Attendance*—“Students are expected to attend regularly all exercises of the course in which they are enrolled. Attention is called to the following regulations on the subject:

1. Two unexcused tardiness shall be counted by the instructor as one absence. If still in the province of the instructor to judge the merits of excuses offered at the close of class.

2. Absences in excess of the last

meeting of a course preceding or first meeting following a holiday or recess shall be counted double.

3. (a) In order to make provision for temporary illness, or other occasions the students may deem important, absences to the number of credit hours in the course are permitted.

(b) Absences from more than the number of credit hours in the course are penalized by a reduction of the final marks in the course. In all such cases the mark will be reduced two ranks for each absence; if a one absence in excess of the credit hours will reduce a grade of B plus to B minus; two absences in excess of the credit hours will reduce a grade of B plus to C.

4. A student who has been absent from a class exercise on account of prolonged absence or extreme emergency may present such reasons to the Registrar and obtain a permit to make up lost work. When such absence will not be counted against her attendance record. Excuses for prolonged illness or extreme emergency must be presented promptly to the Registrar in writing. In the case of the resident student such excuses must be signed by the House Mother, and in the case of non-residents by parent or guardian.

5. Absences from mid-year or final examinations will cause a failure to be listed as the grade for the course except in case of illness or extreme emergency.

6. Absences incurred by the late registration will be counted as an excuse unless an acceptable excuse can be presented in writing at the time of registration.

7. All debatable cases coming under the above regulations may be referred to a Faculty Committee with the President of the College acting as chairman.

8. Each student is held responsible for keeping herself fully informed concerning her attendance record. It is suggested that each student keep a record of her own tardiness and absences. Such information can be verified at the Registrar's office.

Page 85—*Faculty Advisers*—“Every entering student is assigned a Faculty Adviser whom she should consult on all matters pertaining to her studies, college life, or other matters about which the student may desire an adviser's aid.”

The advisers are so assigned that the student comes directly under their instruction in the classroom. During the last two years, her college course the student is assigned an adviser from the department in which she has chosen her major subject.”
