Several Southern states have joined Governor McLean in protesting against legislation which would seriously injure the sale of cotton seed products. The proposed legislative measures, now pending in California, Idaho, Indiana, Missouri, Nebraska, Ohio, Oregon, Utah, and Wisconsin, would almost entirely prevent the sale of cotton seed products in those states, and is particularly directed against oleomargarine.

Governor McLean, of North Carolina, has received opposition to such measures among the Southern States, by telegrams to other governors. Senator Overman, also of North Carolina, added his protest to the legislation against cotton seed products. The governors of Louisiana, Arkansas, Georgia and Florida joined Governor McLean in his protest. The legislature of North Carolina added weight to its protest by adopting resolutions. Governor Walker, of Georgia, suggested that a boycott of states passing such bills under discussion, might be an effective method of protection for the southern states.

From some of the states mentioned came denials that such legislative measures were pending. Such reports came to Governor McLean from Ohio and Missouri. In Wisconsin, the bill is most severe; it prohibits the manufacture or sale of any butter substitute containing vegetable fat. In California, Oregon, and Idaho, better substitutes would be taxed.

The following is an extract from Governor McLean's message to the South Carolina legislature: "This legislation would prove serious injury to the great product of all the cotton states. It is discriminatory and unfair. It is as unfair as if South Carolina were to enact a special prohibitive tax against Oregon apples as in favor of those from Virginia or against corn and hay from the west as in favor of that produced in the south."

Such legislation would destroy all friendly feelings between the states, and especially between those great sections so nearly allied in that they are peculiarly agricultural—the south and the west."

The Poole bill, which was the cause of extensive and heated argument in the North Carolina legislature, was killed by a vote of sixteen to forty-six. The bill prohibited the "teaching of Darwinism or any hypothesis linking man in blood relationship with any of the lower forms of life." The bill is now placed in the "unfavorable calendar" from which it can be removed by a two-thirds vote. The proposed legislation included no penalty, but
