the utmost facility, were especially outstanding in this piece. In the third number in this group, *Song of the Exiles*, the audience could draw a mental picture of the boat carrying the band of exiles, as it floated down the river. The melody was slow, pretty and sweet and the registration created very successfully the dreamy atmosphere. The last piece in this group, *Epiques*, was a picture of childhood memories. The registration was very beautiful and an especially pretty effect was obtained by the occasional use of the bells.

The concluding number on the program, *Concerto Gregoriano*, was composed by Pietro A. Ton who was born in Italy in 1846. Ton has done very successful work as organist at one of the leading Roman Catholic churches in New York and has written ten delightful compositions for the organ. The *Concerto Gregoriano* has, Dean Shirley stated, attracted very much attention recently. It is named for one of the oldest scales used exclusively in church music is the time of Pope Gregory, which is used, also, in the composition of it. This scale, of course very different from our modern one, gives a distinct flavor to the concerto. All three movements, *Adagio*, *Andante Mistico*, and *Allegro Deciso* were unusually interesting. The *Allegro Deciso* was very brilliant, contained many very difficult pedal passages, and ended with a stupendous climax. The Dean played this lovely and unusual program with his usual facility, with great expression, and with beautiful and appropriate registration. The audience thoroughly enjoyed every number on the program and expressed its great appreciation and interest by outbursts of

applause. After hearing the two delightful Lenten organ recitals which have been given by Dean Shirley, every one eagerly awaits the third and last of the series.

## EXCHANGE

French majors will be especially interested in hearing of the Middlebury Summer School of French in Vermont. The Middlebury College was founded some years ago by the Moody family and recently has inaugurated the summer school under the supervision of Mansion Maize, ex-professor of Harvard University, where all of the courses are given in French. The building has been modeled after the chateau and the entire atmosphere is as near that of France as possible. The students eat, sleep, exercise and study in French, for upon entrance they sign a pledge to speak no word of English during the entire course. *—Ignitic.*

All for Hoover.

Herbert Hoover continues as the presidential favorite in the colleges with Al Smith trailing along as outstanding Democratic choice. Of the 2,210 ballots cast at the University of Cincinnati, Hoover received 1,281, which was fifty-eight per cent of all the votes cast, and seventy-five per cent of the Republican poll. Smith stood second with 436 votes which represented eighty-eight per cent of the Democratic choice. The Anti-Saloon League might be interested to know that Smith's main support came from the law college. Here Hoover defeated the New York governor by only four votes, whereas in the other schools he gathered many times the Smith vote.

Stanford University, which has high hopes of becoming alma mater of a president, will dedicate its 1928 year-book to its most prominent alumnus, Herbert Hoover. *—The New Student.*

The program followed will be similar to the Geneva assemblies. Each of the colleges will represent one or more countries. State, Princeton, University of Rochester, St. Lawrence, State College for Teachers, Swarthmore, Syracuse, Union, Vassar, and Wells. *—New Student.*
