## World Events

Washington, D. C.— Most important conference since the war, presented a plan for relief of the economic depression. The sense of his far-reaching proposal is to release the frozen assets of this country by raising a \$500,000,000 fund among private bankers. Also, he would negotiate readjustment of international debt relations during the period of depression. In reply to the president's appeal for public sentiment in behalf of unity of action there came enthusiastic support from both parties. To the American people this plan promises to give definite relief from the present financial crisis.

Madrid, Spain— With the resignation of Alcala Zamora from the office of provisional president of Spain comes the complete separation of church and state. Following restrictions on the Catholic Church made by the assembly, Zamora, a devout Catholic, ceded his position to the new republic to Manuel Azana, his former minister of war. Intense excitement prevailed as the assembly debated the status of the church in the state. Police clubbed a dozen Communists and strove to check the mob outside the chamber of deputies. Azana was selected without a dissenting vote.

Geneva— The League of Nations strives with a problem so serious that it even endangers the life of the League. Before the Council there is a declaration from China that she is resolved to resort to war against Japan, and with it comes a message from Tokyo that she would bitterly resent interference by the League on the U. S. In Tokyo it is asserted that Japan will hold out for negotiations with China alone. Aristide Briand presiding over the Council asserts a solution "must be found at all costs" and "the chief thing is to work fast."
